Smethwick Galton Bridge station was officially opened on Sunday 24 September 1995 by John Prescott MP (Shadow Transport Secretary) and passenger services started the following day. The station was opened as part of the Jewellery Line which saw the line from Birmingham Snow Hill to Smethwick Junction rebuilt to provide a cross city link via Snow Hill. The station was built at the point where the Birmingham Snow Hill to Stourbridge line crossed the Birmingham New Street to Wolverhampton line and is on two levels with platforms serving both lines.

The line had closed on 6 March 1972 when the remaining local services from Birmingham Snow Hill to Wolverhampton Low Level and Birmingham Snow Hill to Langley Green were withdrawn. No station previously existed at this site, although a station at Smethwick West, about 300 yards to the west on the other side of Smethwick Junction served trains from Birmingham New Street to Stourbridge Junction. This station should have closed when Galton Bridge opened, but an administrative error meant that it remained open for two services per week and closed a year later on 29 September 1996.
